




History of Housing Inequality

- (1937) The Federal Housing Administration (FHA) was founded to address the Great Depression's impact on housing.
- Redlining was the tool used by mortgage lenders and banks to refuse mortgage loans to low-income, specifically minority, individuals.





- (1970s) White flight occurred as white residents fled to suburbs while redlining practices prevented residents of color from making the same move.
- People of color who sit at the intersection of racial discrimination and poverty must struggle with these two factors that directly impact their access to fair housing.


Housing in the time of COVID-19



- Nearly 16.5 million renter households have at least one member working in an industry immediately affected by efforts to flatten the curve.
- The CARES Act has only provided temporary and minimal relief for impacted communities.
- Advocates for housing stability have been calling for rent relief programs to help offset long term financial pressure among renters.




Guaranteed Housing Stability Act (bill H.5018)

- About 100,000 Massachusetts
 families, particularly communities of
 color and immigrant communities are
 at risk of eviction now that the state's
 eviction moratorium has expired
- The Guaranteed Housing Stability act ensures rental relief, provides protection to landlords from lost revenue, and will last one year after the state of emergency has ended.
- November 2nd, the act was discharged to the committee on House Rules, where it remains stagnant

Waltham Armory





- WATCH and MetroWestCD are advocating for the city to purchase the abandoned Waltham Armory and convert it into permanently affordable housing
- The proposal is for 17 units for residents making 60% Area Median Income and 6 units for residents making 30% Area Median Income
- The Community Preservation
 Committee has approved \$5 million
 and MetroWest CD will receive \$7
 million from federal and state tax
 dollars

Generic Scripts

There is a 3-5 year wait period to get into Waltham public housing and very few options for safe and affordable housing. Increased affordable housing decreases housing instability, which has been shown to benefit a community's health and prosperity. Please vote in favor of this project. Thank you very much."

Tips & Tricks for Local Advocacy

- Find out when your local town meetings are occurring and try to attend virtually
- Choose a topic that you are interested in and find a local non-profit that you can support
- Don't spread yourself too thin, pick only one or two places to support(join their email list, see what they are advocating for and share their message wherever you can)
 - We know that there are many areas of need, but you are more help when you are not trying to do everything at once so find a project or two that really drives you
- If you want to support something not in your local area, try looking for places to donate
 - We understand this isn't always feasible, but it is a way to support from afar
